Brewed on the same site since 1876, Speight's is perhaps the city's best-known commercial symbol. The Alehouse provides big hearty meals and is perfect for any pre-match feast.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Colin Meads arguably New Zealand's greatest All Black birthday is celebrated at the Speight's Ale House with fan club members wearing No. 5 jerseys, drinking 5oz beers and reading from his book 'Colin Meads All Black' every 5 minutes. Day 2	Visit restaurants, cafes, and bars in the area of Roslyn, Maori Hill and Mornington
	<p>Luna Bar is owned by Ex All Black Greg Cooper, Luna Bar has amazing views over the city and serves great quality food.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Brent Pope RTE Rugby analyst and former Otago rugby player hopes his Irish friends will visit, he will make sure Coops has an Irish jersey on the wall and a pint of Guinness on hold. <p>There are also many cafes and bars that are certainly worth checking out. Mornington Tavern also serves great quality pub meals and is frequently visited by many All Black and Otago Legends.</p>

	<p>Explore the Otago Peninsula</p> <p>Otago Peninsula has been described by internationally acclaimed environmentalist David Bellamy as the “finest example of eco-tourism in the world”.</p> <p>Taiaroa Head is at the end of the peninsula, only 32 kms from the city centre and within sight of the cityscape, is home to the only mainland breeding colony of Albatross in the world. These magnificent birds have a 3 metre wingspan and can travel over 100km an hour.</p> <p>Adding to a unique wildlife experience the Otago Peninsula is also home to one of the world's rarest penguin's the Yellow Eyed penguin or Hoiho its Maori name, which means noise shouter.</p> <p>Discover New Zealand's only castle, built 1871 by William Larnach, merchant baron and politician, and still privately owned and cared for, featuring magnificent architecture, superb craftsmanship, tragic and scandalous history.</p> <p>All Black Adam Thomson says “it is a must to see the Royal Albatross, the Yellow Eyed Penguin and to visit New Zealand's only castle Larnach Castle.”</p> <p>www.dunedinnz.com</p>

	<p>Taieri Gorge Railway</p> <p>The Taieri Gorge Railway leaves from Dunedin Railway Station one of the most photographed buildings in the world. The train negotiates this exhilarating narrow river gorge and cliff hugging tunnels and viaducts soaring above the river. Take a photo on the open air platforms or wait until the train stops for a scenic photo opportunity.
